



### MONROVIA CENTENNIAL REVIEW

This handsome book gives a nostalgic look at one of Southern California's earliest pioneer cities. It is hardbound in an 8½ x 11-inch format, with 300 pages containing 250 photographs, including a four-color section reproducing vintage postcards of early Monrovia scenes. The book is encased in a full-color dust jacket.

Through rare photographs from private collections, along with a review of Monrovia's newspapers, the Centennial Review chronicles the city's role in the 1880s California land boom. The book also provides some insight into the population explosion of the southern counties, and the changing and expanding of West Coast industries.

Backed by the San Gabriel Mountains, with a view to the Pacific Ocean, Monrovia captured the hearts of all who stopped long enough to see its potential and sample its hospitality.

By the turn of the century, Monrovia, just 20 miles northeast of Los Angeles, had become a hub of the northern San Gabriel Valley. Wealthy Eastern entrepreneurs chose Monrovia for their winter homes, and stayed to invest in the booming town. The Easterners infused community life with both a pioneering spirit and a cultural depth; and through their financial networks, connected Monrovia to the rest of Southern California.

The Monrovia Centennial Review will provide those interested in Southern California history with a thoughtful look at the part played by the small town in the development of the Los Angeles basin into a megalopolis.

Written by longtime Monrovian, Peter Ostrye, and produced and printed by The Castle Press of Pasadena, the Monrovia Centennial Review is of collector quality and will become a worthy addition to any library.



Each year the club awards academic scholarships to senior students at Monrovia High School and Canyon High School, a continuation high school. The high school career centers make scholarship information available to the students and the counselling center makes a preliminary screening. Ten to twelve finalists are personally interviewed by Rotarians at Monrovia High School and eight are selected for \$250 scholarships. Canyon High School administration selects two recipients from that school. Scholarships are awarded at commencement ceremonies or awards night and certificates are presented at a Rotary meeting. Scholarships are paid upon enrollment for advanced education.

#### GUIDELINES

#### MONROVIA ROTARY CLUB SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

- 1. Awards will be made annually to Monrovia High School and Canyon High School seniors. The number and amount of the awards will be determined annually by the Board of Directors, upon recommendation of the Scholarship Committee.
- 2. The purpose of the scholarships is to recognize outstanding academic achievement in high school. The monetary awards are intended to assist the student with costs of further education.
- 3. The recipients will be chosen in cooperation with the Monrovia High School Scholarship Coordinator and the Canyon High School administration. The Scholarship Committee will conduct interviews and examine applicants' resumes to select the final award recipients.
- 4. Awards will be based primarily on academic achievement in all areas of study. Student activities and financial need may be considered if applicants are otherwise equally qualifed by reason of academic achievement.
- 5. The interviews shall be by two or more Rotarians, who shall make the final selections. The interviewers should try as much as possible to learn something about the student's character and integrity, keeping in mind that the final selection may be a difficult choice between applicants having similar qualifications from academics, activities, and financial need. The final choice will of necessity include subjective assessment by the interviewers.
- 6. Awards will be made on High School Awards Night or graduation exercises and will be accompanied by a certificate or plaque supplied by the Monrovia Rotary Club. Award recipients will be invited to a Monrovia Rotary Club luncheon meeting for recognition.
- 7. Award recipients will be supplied with written instructions concerning payment of the awards. The Club Treasurer shall maintain records of recipients and payments.
- 8. The award must be claimed within a two year period beginning on July 1 of the year in which the award is made. The award will be paid to the institution of further education or to the student upon verification of enrollment at such institution. The Rotary Club Board of Directors may for good cause authorize payment of the award without such verification of enrollment.


